this collection of essays offers a comparative perspective on different forms of representation of social hybridity in contemporary novels through various cultural and linguistic lenses it explores the various subcategories of their interdependent relationships including power and domination between hegemony and marginality the book revolves around five axes namely writing strategies and reterritorialization marginality and intermediary spaces revisited urban spaces when periphery becomes center and the modality of confrontation and construction of identity it focuses on the identification and classification of spaces in order to understand their function in relation to the thematic strategy of the novel its main objective is identifying the textual representation of the challenge of center and periphery as well as these concepts role and significance in diegesis thus new light is shed on the subject and on

forces of the diaspora where home in addition to the physical native place of birth or permanent place of shelter can take on forms of imaginary exile unbelonging within the same place without physical estrangement as martin heidegger recognizes home can paradoxically be constituted as a form of control namely from the inside out from the existential feeling of not being at home samad irena and josef of white teeth and ignorance respectively are analyzed on their alternative quests for control of identity replacing the trace of god with a trace now of home samad irena and josef face limitless freedom outside their native and geographic contexts which entails at the same time a sense of disorientation they feel compelled to achieve meaningful identity based on a left over notion of home or in the converse to utilize what they control as home to avoid at least self annihilation this thesis contends in the contemporary narratives studied that there is a tendency for the individual to avoid estrangement or perceived unnatural provisional separations from the idea of home and second therefore to seek to control of identity formation in the name of seeking home such control is desired by reflex of aversion to estrangement which can be felt with the liberation from god or the distances from the geographies or assumptions of home this thesis will expound therefore upon the stages of estrangement through first an initial and tentative placement of home then displacement through physical departure exile revisited attempts at re placement along a nostalgic trace of belonging toward a home in the identity negotiation and the returnability of the displaced person to adopt a native home after prolonged absence in conclusion considering the placement of the self somewhere in order to gain control over identity inside an environment of displacement in physical and updated exile away from place of birth or even in the form of tragic imagination to be discussed a trace of home like an absent god in waiting for godot for example cannot be relinquished altogether as a point of reference for reinvention of identity while it can still be reinvented and updated at

the same time however even this trace remains an illusion of the displaced person reflecting an ache for certainty of roots as a point of reference for identity formation rather than a route running backwards or forwards towards a feasible alternative home doi 10.5353/th.b5090007 subjects displacement psychology in literature since the 1990s the screening of sex on american british and asian television screens has become increasingly prolific considering not only the specificities of selected sexualised images in relation to popular series this study also concerns itself with the ramifications of tv sex as well as discussing the various techniques that are used by tv producers programme makers to establish the cultural worth of their texts in series such as shameless the tudors and true blood the contributions draw attention to shifting representations of sex on television away from the authoritarian state and patriarchal order toward a more democratic form of representation as a significant and under represented aspect of contemporary television studies this is the first full length academic collection to consider the wide ranging representations of sex in society on contemporary television natal signs cultural representations of pregnancy birth and parenting explores some of the ways in which reproductive experiences are taken up in the rich arena of cultural production the chapters in this collection pose questions unsettle assumptions and generate broad imaginative spaces for thinking about representation of pregnancy birth and parenting they demonstrate the ways in which practices of consuming and using representations carry within them the productive forces of creation bringing together an eclectic and vibrant range of perspectives this collection offers readers the possibility to rethink and reimagine the diverse meanings and practices of representations of these significant life events engaging theoretical reflection and creative image making the contributors explore a broad range of cultural signs with a focus on challenging authoritative representations in a manner that seeks to reveal rather than conceal the insistently problematic and contestable nature of

image culture natal signs gathers an exciting set of critically engaged voices to reflect on some of life's most meaningful moments in ways that affirm natality as the renewed promise of possibility immigrants from the low countries constituted the largest population of resident aliens in early modern England possessing superior technology in a number of fields and enjoying governmental protection the Flemish were charged by many native artisans with unfair economic competition with xenophobic sentiments running so high that riots and disorders occurred throughout the sixteenth century Elizabeth I directed her dramatic censor to suppress material that might incite further disorder forcing playwrights to develop strategies to address the alien problem indirectly representations of Flemish immigrants on the early modern stage describes the immigrant community during this period and explores the consistently negative representations of Flemish immigrants in Tudor interludes the impact of censorship the playwrighting strategies that eluded it and the continuation of these methods until the closing of the theatres in 1642 representation is integral to the functioning and legitimacy of modern government yet political theorists have often been reluctant to engage directly with questions of representation and empirical political scientists have closed down such questions by making representation synonymous with congruence conceptually unproblematic and normatively inert for some representation has been deemed impossible to pin down analytically and to defend normatively by others but this is changing political theorists are now turning to political representation as a subject worthy of theoretical investigation in its own right in their effort to rework the theory of political representation they are also hoping to impact how representation is assessed and studied empirically this volume gathers together chapters by key contributors to what amounts to a representative turn in political theory their approaches and emphases are diverse but taken together they represent a compelling and original attempt at re

both of people and of ecosystems these dehumanizing and speciesist strategies of subjugation have perpetuated interlocking patterns of social injustice and environmental depletion that constitute the most salient challenges facing humankind today through a novel approach that merges visual studies critical race theory and animal studies this interdisciplinary investigation historicizes the evolution of the boundaries between human and non human animals during the modern period the book will be of interest to scholars working in art history visual studies critical race theory colonial and post colonial studies animal studies and french studies what use is it to be given authority over men and lands if others do not know about it furthermore what use is that authority if those who know about it do not respect it or recognise its jurisdiction and what strategies and language written and spoken visual and auditory material cultural and political did those in authority throughout the medieval and early modern era use to project and make known their power these questions have been crucial since regulations for governance entered society and are found at the core of this volume in order to address these issues from an historical perspective this collection of essays considers representations of authority made by a cross section of society within the british isles arranged in thematic sections the 14 essays in the collection bridge the divide between medieval and early modern to build up understanding of the developments and continuities that can be followed across the centuries in question whether crown or noble government or church burgh or merchant all desired power and influence but their means of representing authority were very different these essays encompass a myriad of methods demonstrating power and disseminating the image of authority including material culture art literature architecture and landscapes saintly cults speeches and propaganda martial posturing and strategic alliances music liturgy and ceremonial display thus this interdisciplinary collection illuminates the variable forms in which authority was presented by key individuals and institutions in

scotland and the british isles by placing these within the context of the european powers with whom they interacted this volume also underlines the unique relationships developed between the people and those who exercised authority over them the idea of virtual realities has a long and complex historical trajectory spanning from plato s concept of the cave and the simulacrum to artistic styles such as trompe l oeil and more recently developments in 3d film television and gaming however this book will pay particular attention to the time between the 1980s to the 1990s when virtual reality and cyberspace were represented particularly in fiction as a wondrous technology that enabled transcendence from the limitations of physical embodiment the purpose of this critical historical analysis of representations of virtual reality is to examine how they might deny repress or overlook embodied experience specifically the author will contend that embodiment is a fundamental aspect of immersion in virtual reality rather than something which is to be transcended in this way the book aims to challenge distorted ideas about transcendence and productively contribute to debates about embodiment and technology a fresh exploration of the representation of poverty and class in american literature and film through the juxtaposition of films writings and the unusual lives of zora neale hurston stephen crane henry miller and michel foucault the book argues for hurston s centrality not merely to the african american canon but to the american tradition this thesis analyses the representations of teenage muslim girls in randa abdel fattah s novels ten things i hate about me and does my head look big in this mohja kahf s the girl in the tangerine scarf and aliya husain s neither this nor that all are set in the united states and australia with the central motif of the hijab as a symbol of female oppression this book looks at social representations of romantic love as portrayed in films and interpreted by their audiences using cinema as a means for analysing the state of romantic love today and the touchpoints and disconnects between its representation on screen

and the lived experiences of film audiences through a media sociology lens the book draws on analysis of five contemporary romantic films and the meanings brought to and made from them by socially and economically diverse audiences employing both textual analysis and primary interviews the book contests overly pessimistic perspectives on modern intimacy while acknowledging and exploring some of the challenges woes and changes that romantic love is experiencing in late capitalism concerns and debates over monogamy the teleology romantic love and the division of labour in relationships percolate in this book s examination of how audiences responses to these films reflect their attitudes and expectations regarding romantic love this book will have great resonance for scholars and students of not just film studies and media studies but also audience studies media sociology philosophy gender and sexuality in this accessible combination of post colonial theory feminism and pedagogy the author advocates using subversive and contemporary artistic representations of women to remodel traditional stereotypes in education it is in this key sector that values and norms are molded and prejudice kept at bay yet the legacy of colonialism continues to pervade official education received in classrooms as well as unofficial education ingested via popular culture and the media the result is a variety of distorted images of women and gender in which women appear as two dimensional stereotypes the text analyzes both current and historical colonial representations of women in a pedagogical context in doing so it seeks to recast our conception of what difference is challenging historical patriarchal gender relations with their stereotypical representations that continue to marginalize minority populations in the first world and billions of women elsewhere these distorted images the book argues can be subverted using the semiology provided by postcolonialism and transnational feminism and the work of contemporary artists who rethink and recontextualize the visual codes of colonialism these resistive images created by women

who challenge and subvert patriarchal modes of representation can be used to create educational environments that provide an alternative view of women of non western origin this book examines how representations of african in the anglophone west have changed in the post imperial age the period since the second world war has seen profound changes in sub saharan africa notably because of decolonization the creation of independent nation states and the transformation of the relationships with the west using a range of case studies from news media maps popular culture film and tv the contributions assess how narrative and counter narratives have developed and been received by their audiences in light of these changes examining the overlapping areas between media representations and historical events this book will be of interest to students and scholars of african studies and media and cultural studies an interdisciplinary group of scholars applies the reinterpetive concept of visual culture to the english renaissance bringing attention to the visual issues that have appeared persistently though often marginally in the newer criticisms of the last decade the authors write in a diversity of voices on a range of subjects common among them however is a concern with the visual technologies that underlie the representation of the body of race of nation and of empire several essays focus on the construction and representation of the human body including an examination of anatomy as procedure and visual concept and a look at early cartographic practice to reveal the correspondences between maps and the female body in one essay early tudor portraits are studied to develop theoretical analogies and historical links between verbal and visual portrayal in another connections in tudor stuart drama are drawn between the female body and the textiles made by women a second group of essays considers issues of colonization empire and race they approach a variety of visual materials including sixteenth century representations of the new world that helped formulate a consciousness of subjugation the drake jewel and the myth of the

black emperor as indices of elizabethan colonial ideology and depictions of the queen of sheba among other black women present in early modern painting one chapter considers the politics of collecting the aesthetic and imperial agendas of a van dyck portrait are uncovered in another essay while elsewhere that same portrait is linked to issues of whiteness and blackness as they are concentrated within the ceremonies and trappings of the order of the garter all of the essays in early modern visual culture explore the social context in which paintings statues textiles maps and other artifacts are produced and consumed they also explore how those artifacts and the acts of creating collecting and admiring them are themselves mechanisms for fashioning the body and identity situating the self within a social order defining the otherness of race ethnicity and gender and establishing relationships of power over others based on exploration surveillance and insight exploring the mechanisms and strategies used in different cultures across hispano america and the caribbean to narrativise represent and understand hiv aids as a social and human phenomenon this book examines a wide range of cultural artistic and media texts as well as issues of human phenomenology to understand the ways in which hiv positive individuals make sense of their own lives and of the ways in which the rest of society sees them drawing on a variety of cultural texts from cinema television photography and literature the author considers the manner in which contemporary cultural forms have shaped a body of public opinion in response to the social and cultural impact of hiv aids re interpreting the condition in the light of advances in treatment with attention to both the temporality and spatiality of production this book examines whether heterosexual and homosexual and masculine and feminine bodies are narrativised in the same manner considering the question of whether representations foster discrimination of any kind the book also asks whether representations across latin america are homogenous or varied according to national social or cultural context and explores the

commonalities between the representations of HIV/AIDS in Hispanic America and the Caribbean and other global narratives a detailed study of the various representations of HIV/AIDS and the construction of public opinion this book will appeal to scholars of cultural media and film studies the sociology of health the body and illness and Latin American and Caribbean studies the theme of female transformation informs the Hollywood representation of femininity from the studio era to the present whether it occurs physically emotionally or on some other level transformation allows female protagonists to negotiate their own complex desires and to resist the compulsory marriage plot a sweeping study of Hollywood from *Now Voyager* the *Heiress* and *Flamingo Road* to *Carrie* the alien films *The Brave One* and the slasher horror genre this book boldly unsettles commonplace understandings of genre film female sexuality and Freudian theory as it makes a strong new case for the queer relevance of female representation this concentrated survey of works by a diverse roster of artists representing three generations and including Jenny Holzer Suzanne Lacy Ana Mendieta Senga Nengudi Yoko Ono and Kara Walker which aims to fill a gap in the history of art where the subject of rape has been represented by countless historical depictions by male artists called heroic acts by Susan Brownmiller what makes women's works radically different is the focus not on the action or drama but on the lasting psychological devastation of the victim her suffering silence shame and loneliness recent works also address regaining control over the victim's sexuality and psyche and reclaiming the cultural narrative often strikingly beautiful these works are rarely shown or their true meaning is obscured page 3 through reflecting on the legacy of totalitarianism and the revolutions of 1989 it becomes clear that the issue is less of whether one should remember but rather how to internalize the various lessons of the past for the future of Europe memory and representation in contemporary Europe thus offers the reader occasions upon which to take stock of different but

representations of pain in art and the media their essays are firmly anchored on consideration of the images not on whatever actual pain the subjects suffered at issue is representation before and often apart from events in the world part one concerns practices in which the appearance of pain is understood as expressive topics discussed include the strange dynamics of faked pain and real pain contemporary performance art international photojournalism surrealism and renaissance and baroque art part two concerns representations that cannot be readily assigned to that genealogy the chinese form of execution known as lingchi popularly the death of a thousand cuts whippings in the belgian congo american lynching photographs boer war concentration camp photographs and recent american capital punishment these examples do not comprise a single alternate genealogy but are united by the absence of an intention to represent pain the book concludes with a roundtable discussion where the authors discuss the ethical implications of viewing such images this book offers a multifaceted investigation of the dynamic interrelations between visual arts and representation interdependent to urban spaces in china

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
